## **Understanding Student Engagement**

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## **Conceptual Framework of Student Engagement**

Student engagement is widely recognised as critical to student retention and success. We understand engagement as the individual student's psychosocial state: their emotional, cognitive, and behavioural connection to their learning. Kahu and Nelson's (2018) conceptual framework of student engagement shown below argues that the student experience occurs within an educational interface – a dynamic space at the intersection of student and institution. A complex array of factors impact student engagement directly, and also

indirectly via four pathways: self-efficacy, emotion, belonging, and wellbeing. Each of these psychosocial constructs stems from the interaction of student and institutional factors, and influences the student's engagement – positively or negatively. The quotes below illustrate those pathways; they are drawn from a study following 19 young students through their first year at an Australian regional university. The students were interviewed about their experiences before the year started and then weekly during the semesters.
